Part III, Chapters 15-17

Tell about what time in your life you recall when you hear the word 'finished'. Tell about when you realized you had to let go of a previous idea of what Christianity was.

Tell about a time you felt someone you were close to was going in the wrong direction.

I wonder what made Judas do it. I wonder if you've touched a dead body. I wonder whether you're more likely to airbrush out the water or the blood.
