

WELCOME Prelude Call to Worship

In the midst of rising costs, debt, illness, all the hardships of life, why have you come to worship?

We come because Isaiah reminds us that no suffering or pain can separate us from God.

I hear the Prophet calling, "Arise, shine for your light has come!" I'm ready for that bright light from God to light my way. We see that light in Jesus, God-with-Us, and we recognize that light in our lives too. We are all created in God's image: God's light was born in us as we breathed our first breath.

We come to worship to connect God's light in us to God's light in Christ, and so illumine the world.

What a reason to worship!

How do we recognize that light?

In compassion for all, in justice for the poor, in welcome for the stranger we shine God's light into the world. So come let us bring the joys and hardships of life to worship

and celebrate that God's light is already with us and within us.

Arise, your light is come! The Spirit's call obey; show forth the glory of your God, which sines on you today.

Arise, your light is come! Fling wide the prison door; proclaim the captives' liberty, good tidings to the poor.

Arise, your light is come! all you in sorrow born, bind up the brokenhearted ones and comfort those who mourn.

Arise, your light is come! The mountains burst in song! Rise up like eagles on the wing; God's power will make us strong.

COVENANT & COMMUNION

THE INVITATION

This covenant I advise you to make, not only in heart, but in word; not only in word, but in writing; and that you would with all possible reverence spread the writing before the Lord, as if you would present it to him as your act and deed: and when you have done this, set your hand to it: keep it as a memorial of the solemn transactions that have passed between God and you, that you may have recourse to it in doubts and temptations.

> O Most Holy God, for the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, we offer ourselves to you as prodigals at your doorstep. We have fallen short because of our sins, and are prone to wickedness and evil in the world. But you have promised mercy to us in Christ, and you call us to turn to you with all of our hearts. Therefore, by the call of your gospel, we come now, without reluctance, to submit ourselves to your mercy.

Response: "A Charge to Keep I Have," No. 413, v. 1, *The United Methodist Hymnal* (1989) A charge to keep I have, a God to glorify, A never-dying soul to save, and fit it for the sky.

WE CONFIDE IN GOD

Having a full, life-giving relationship with God means putting away our idols, and being against that which God is against. Therefore, renounce those things from the bottom of your hearts, and in full covenant, use all the means that you know to refuse sin and corruption in your lives.

> O God, though we once were of the world, we now resign our hearts to you, humbly bowing before your majesty, with firm resolution in our hearts.

To serve the present age, my calling to fulfill; O may it all my powers engage to do my Master's will!

WE COMPOSE OUR SPIRITS

Let us pray.

O God, we wholeheartedly desire your grace, so that we might follow your call with resolve, forsake the world, turn away from sin, and turn to you. We will guard against all temptations, in good times and bad, lest they draw us away from you. We acknowledge our own powerlessness against such forces, and rely on your righteousness and strength.

Silent prayer of confession.

God is boundless in mercy and great grace, and offers us again to be our God through Christ. Therefore we solemnly pledge ourselves to God, bowing before God's majesty.

> We take you as our Lord Jehovah, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We yield our whole selves, body and soul, for your service, promising and vowing to serve you in holiness and righteousness every day of our lives.

Arm me with jealous care, as in thy sight to live, And oh, thy servant, Lord, prepare a strict account to give.

WE CLAIM THE COVENANT

Since God has given Jesus as the only way to God, solemnly accept Jesus as the only new and living way, by which sinners may come to God. I call you to join in covenant with God.

If you are looking to find meaningful relationship with God and are willing to commit to the Way found in Jesus Christ, I invite you join me in this covenant prayer in the Wesleyan tradition.

> I am no longer my own, but thine. Put me to what thou wilt, rank me with whom thou wilt. Put me to doing, put me to suffering. Let me be employed for thee or laid aside for thee, exalted for thee or brought low for thee. Let me be full, let me be empty. Let me have all things, let me have nothing. I freely and heartily yield all things to thy pleasure and disposal.

And now, O glorious and blessed God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, thou art mine, and I am thine. So be it. And the covenant which I have made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven. Amen.

Help me to watch and pray, and on thyself rely, assured, if I my trust betray, I shall forever die.

WE CHOOSE FAITHFULNESS

Let us pray.

O God, because you have been pleased to give your holy law as the rule of my life and the way I should walk in your kingdom, I willingly submit myself to you, set my shoulder to your burden, and subscribe in all your laws as holy, just, and good. I solemnly take them, as the rule of my words, thoughts and actions, promising that though my flesh might contradict and rebel, I will try to order and govern my whole life according to your direction, and will not allow myself to neglect any of my duties to you. Now, Almighty God, searcher of hearts, you know that I make this covenant with you today without deceit or reservation, asking you, that if you see any flaw or falsehood in me, that you would reveal it to me and help me to get right with you.

WE OFFER OUR THANKS AND PRAISE

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them up to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The pastor gives thanks appropriate to the occasion, remembering God's acts of salvation, and concludes:

And so, with your people on earth and all the company of heaven we praise your name and join their unending hymn:

> Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The pastor continues the thanksgiving. The institution of the Lord's Supper is recalled. The pastor concludes:

And so, in remembrance of these your mighty acts in Jesus Christ, we offer ourselves in praise and thanksgiving as a holy and living sacrifice, in union with Christ's offering for us, as we proclaim the mystery of faith.

Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

The pastor invokes the present work of the Holy Spirit and then praises the Trinity, concluding: And now, glory be to you, O God the Father.

> From this day forward I look upon you as my Light and my God, knowing that you will forever show me the Way even when I am lost.

Glory be to you, O God the Son.

You have loved me and washed me from my sins, and you are my Savior and Redeemer.

Glory be to you, O God the Holy Spirit. By the power of your hand, you have turned our hearts away from sin and back to you.

O holy and powerful God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, you are now my Covenant-Friend, and through your infinite grace, I am your Covenant-Servant. Amen.

So be it.

And the covenant which we have made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven.
