

An Introduction to this Service of Tenebrae

A Service of Tenebrae, or "Shadows," is based on a twelfth-century late night/early morning service and is an extended meditation on the passion of Christ. The service includes "lengthening shadows" as candles are extinguished till the sanctuary is near dark at the end.

This service is taken from *The United Methodist Book of Worship* (1992). The 16 readings that tell the story of Christ's passion is by James H. Charlesworth. He accurately translates John 18:1-19:42, with special sensitivity to Jews, Judaism, Jesus' Jewishness, and the Jewish origins of Christianity.

This worship aid includes all hymns that will be sung during the service, in the order they are going to be sung. It also includes the Lord's Prayer which will be said communally at the conclusion of the service.

After the Lord's Prayer, there will be a "postlude" for quiet reflection. The service will end in silence. Please feel free to stay as long as you like to pray and meditate. Leave the sanctuary in silence.
